You have applied to participate in the Athenian School's Exchange Program and have been provisionally
placed to go on exchange to a specific school and country described below (the 'Activity'). Activities

# PLEASE READ THIS AGREEMENT CAREFULLY - IT IS A LEGAL CONTRACT AND AFFECTS ANY RIGHTS YOU MAY HAVE IF YOU ARE INJURED OR OTHERWISE SUFFER DAMAGES WHILE PARTICIPATING IN THE ACTIVITY.

1. **Assumption of Risks of Travel and Program Participation**: I understand that participation in Athenian's exchange program is entirely voluntary and that the Athenian School makes no representation about the safety or security of the location of the exchange or the modes of travel in connection with the Activity.

I understand that risks are inherent in traveling to and living in unfamiliar settings in foreign countries. I understand that the political, environmental and cultural situations in foreign countries differ from those in my own country and the Athenian School environment. I understand there are health risks, as well as risks associated with aircraft, motor vehicles, alternative modes of transportation, and potentially poor driving conditions. I also understand that by going on exchange in a foreign country subjects me to the laws of that country, which may be significantly different from the laws of the United States. I have weighed the dangers inherent in international travel and living abroad, the risks presented to my own health and well-being, and my desire for personal growth and experience. I acknowledge there may be additional factors of which I am unaware or which have not been brought to my attention. These risks could result in property damage and/or bodily injury, up to and including imprisonment, kidnapping and even death. I agree to accept and assume, knowingly and voluntarily, all risks associated with the Activity whether present or future, known or unknown, arising from or as a result of my voluntary participation in the Activity. I have discussed the risks associated with my participation in the Activity with a parent/guardian as reflected by the signature of such parent/guardian below. I hereby elect to participate in the Activity.

### Some Possible Risks

Road traffic accident	Probably the most dangerous activity undertaken while living abroad is
	traveling in cars or other vehicles. Students should always wear a seat belt.
	Students should never be driven by a driver without a license or a drunk
	driver. Students should become familiar with pedestrian rules in their host
	country. Drivers in many countries do not defer to pedestrians in cross-
	walks. Student pedestrians need to take special care when walking in
	countries where the traffic drives on the left side of the road as cars will be
	coming from unexpected locations.

High-risk activity	Student's parents should communicate in advance with host parents about
	possible high-risk activities (such as swimming, cycling, sailing, para-
	sailing, parties).
Illness or Disease	While living in a foreign country, students may be exposed to different
	diseases or become ill. Before departing for exchange, students going on
	exchange should visit their doctor or a travel clinic to get any necessary
	immunizations or medications needed for their country (e.g. anti-malarial
	prophylactic). The Centers for Disease Control website has information on
	health issues in different countries and recommended immunizations and
	medications. While in-country, students should take care to ensure their
	ongoing health (e.g. washing hands before each meal).
Being a victim of crime	Newly-arrived travelers are more vulnerable as targets of crime because
Doing a victim of crime	they: 1) are unfamiliar with their surroundings, 2) might not speak the local
	language well, 3) are recognizable as foreigners, 4) have not yet learned the
	social norms or unwritten rules of conduct, 5) are eager to get to know new

	around them. Students should realize that their new friends are a good
	source of information if they warn of dangers, but as teenagers themselves,

- 2. **Behavior Expectations of the Participant**: I understand that as a participant, I have the responsibility to contribute to the success of the Activity by conducting myself in a manner that reflects favorably on The Athenian School and all participants in the exchange program. I certify that I will complete all preparation activities as mandated by The Athenian School's Exchange Program and will complete all follow-up activities. I further understand that The Athenian School reserves the right to decline to approve my application to participate in the Activity or to decline to provide continuing support for my participation in the Activity at any time should my actions impede the operation of The Athenian School's Exchange Program or the rights or welfare of any person.
- 3. **Participant Obligations Relating to Medical Needs and Insurance**: By signing this Participation Agreement I agree:
- A. To furnish The Athenian School's Exchange Program with requested medical information.

B. To bear all financial responsibility for any medical treatment arising from my participation in the Athenian School's Exchange Program, and specifically to obtain and maintain throughout the Activity coverage under a policy of comprehensive health and accident insurance. Such policy shall provide coverage for injuries and illnesses I sustain or experience while participating in the Activity, or as a consequence of my participation in the Activity. The Athenian School shall not provide medical insurance for, or assume financial responsibility for, any injury or illness I may incur while participating in the Activity or as a consequence of my participation in the Activity.

#### 4. RELEASE AND WAIVER OF LIABILITY

In return for The Athenian School providing for my participation in the Activity and having read and understood this Participation Agreement, I hereby voluntarily agree to the following:

A. I RELEASE, WAIVE, DISCHARGE AND COVENANT NOT TO SUE The Athenian School, its affiliates, trustees, officers, employees or agents, (hereinafter referred to as RELEASEES) for any liability, claim, and/or cause of action arising out of or related to any loss, damage, injury or harm of any sort, including death or imprisonment, that may be sustained by me, and for damage to any property belonging to me, that occurs as a result of my traveling to or from any site in connection with the Activity, or as a result of my participation in the Activity, except any liability, claims, causes of action, losses, damages or injuries caused directly by the negligent acts or omissions. It is my intent and agreement that the terms of this paragraph 4 shall bind any person asserting rights on my behalf, or otherwise asserting claims by or through me, including my spouse, family members, heirs, assigns and personal representatives.

B. I further agree that this Participation Agreement, including this paragraph 4 shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the state of California.
